Children will know that: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Christians believe God created our World. 	Christians believe: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> God created the whole universe. The Earth and everything in it are important to God. Humans should care for the world because it belongs to God. 	Christians believe: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> God the Creator cares for the creation, including human beings. Adam and Eve (Genesis 3) spoiled human friendship with God (sometimes called 'the Fall'). The Bible says that God offers forgiveness and shows good ways to live (such as the Ten Commandments), Obedience and worship, includes saying sorry brings Christians closer to God. 	Pupils will know that: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> There is much debate about the story of creation in Genesis and contemporary scientific accounts. Many scientists are Christians.

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Christians worship at our local church – special place. The vicar works at the local church. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Baptism and marriage bring people closer to God. A church or Christian building contains sacred artefacts, symbols and ceremonial items. Christians believe we should care for each other and support charities. Christians pray to God and Jesus. Christians worship through prayer, music and reading from the bible. 	Pupils will know that: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> The Old Testament tells the story of a the children of Israel — known as the People of God. The People of God try to live in the way God wants, following his commands and worshipping him. Bible stories show how God kept his promises to the children of God Christians believe that, through Jesus, all people can become the People of God. 	Pupils will know that: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> The Old Testament pieces together the story of the people of God from being nomads (Abraham, Jacob) to being city dwellers (David)). The story of Moses and the Exodus shows how God rescued his people from slavery in Egypt; Christians see Jesus' death and resurrection as also rescuing people from slavery to sin. Christians apply this idea to living today by trying to serve God and to bring freedom to others: for example, loving others, caring for them, bringing health, food, justice, and telling the story of Jesus.

Children will know that: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Jesus came to show people God's love for all. Jesus's birth and life is celebrated at Christmas and Easter 	Pupils will know that: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Jesus was born as a baby in Bethlehem. Jesus is the son of God. Jesus was kind. Jesus performed miracles. The Bible describes his extraordinary birth and life. 	Pupils will know that: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Christians worship God as Trinity God the Father, God the Son (Jesus) and God the Holy Spirit. Christians believe the Holy Spirit is God's power at work in the world, enabling them to follow Jesus. 	Pupils will know that: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Jesus was Jewish. Christians believe Jesus is God in the flesh. They believe that his birth, life, death and resurrection were part of a longer plan by God to restore the relationship between humans and God.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Jesus came to bring good news (Luke) – God loves us and forgives us our bad deeds. Christians celebrate Jesus’ birth, and Advent. Jesus had a group of disciples. 		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The Old Testament talks about messiah. Christians believe that Jesus is the Messiah and their Saviour (Jewish people do not think Jesus is the Messiah.).

Children will know that: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> The bible is a special book with stories about God and Jesus. 	Pupils will know that: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Christians believe Jesus is a friend to the poor and friendless. Christians believe Jesus’ teachings make people think hard about how to live and show them the right way. <p>The bible is a sacred text from God and should be treated with respect</p>	Pupils will know that: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Christians believe Jesus’ life shows what it means to love God (his Father) and love your neighbour - putting others first. Christians try to be like Jesus and put his teaching and example into practice in lots of ways, from church worship to social justice. <p>Jesus had 12 disciples.</p>	Pupils will know that: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Christians believe Jesus offers a way to heal the damage done by human sin. Christians believe that Jesus’ good news not only transforms lives now, but also in the future. Christians believe that they should bring this good news to life in their personal lives, with family, with their neighbours, in the local, national and global community.
Salvation

Children will know that: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Christians try to show love to others. 	Pupils will know that: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Easter teaches that Jesus was willing to forgive all people, even for putting him on the cross. <p>Jesus’ name means ‘He saves’.</p>	Pupils will know that: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> The events of Holy Week outline Jesus’s last week leading to his death and resurrection. Christians believe Jesus rose from the dead, and is still alive today, giving people hope of a new life. Christians celebrate Pentecost, as the beginning of the Church. <p>Pentecost celebrates Jesus sending the Holy Spirit to his disciples.</p>	Pupils will know that: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Christians read the ‘big story’ of the Bible as pointing out the need for God to save people. This salvation includes the ongoing restoration of humans’ relationship with God. The Gospels give accounts of Jesus’ death and resurrection. Christians interpret Jesus’ death as ‘for us’ for example rescuing the lost and leading them to God; leading from darkness to light, from slavery to freedom. Christians remember Jesus’ sacrifice through the service of Holy Communion (also called the Lord’s Supper, the Eucharist or the Mass). Belief in Jesus’ resurrection confirms to Christians that Jesus is God’s and that death is not the end. Christians hope for life with God, starting now and continuing in a new life (heaven). Christians believe that Jesus calls them to sacrifice their own needs to the needs of Others.
Kingdom of God

		Pupils will know that: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Christians believe that Jesus inaugurated the ‘Kingdom of God’ — i.e. Jesus’ whole life was a demonstration of his belief that God is king, not just in heaven but here and now. (‘Your kingdom come, your will be done on earth as it is in heaven’.) Christians believe Jesus is still alive, rules in their hearts and lives through the Holy Spirit, if they let him. 	Pupils will know that: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Jesus told many parables about the Kingdom of God. The parables suggest that there will be a future Kingdom, where God’s reign will be complete. The Kingdom is compared to a feast where all are invited to join in. Not everyone chooses to do so. Many Christians try to extend the Kingdom of God by challenging unjust social structures in their locality and in the world.
