Shabbat is a special day of the week for Jewish people and how it is celebrated - candles, blessing the children, wine, challah bread, family meal, rest. The festivals of Sukkoth, Chanukah or Pesach (Passover), the stories and meanings associated with them; The use of the menorah (7 branched candlestick) The use of the 9-branched Chanukiah and how it links to the story of Chanukah. The Torah (part of Tenakh) is often read from scrolls in the synagogue, beautifully written in Hebrew - read some related stories e.g. 'Joseph and his brothers' (Genesis 37, 39–48); the story of Moses (book of Exodus); 'The call of Samuel' (1 Samuel 3); 'David and Goliath' (1 Samuel 17); Jonah (Book of Jonah). The meanings of signs, symbols, artefacts and actions in the Synagogue and how they help in worship e.g. synagogue: ark, Ner Tamid, Torah scroll, tzitzit (tassels), tefillin, tallit (prayer shawl) and kippah (skullcap), hanukkah, bimah Standing under the <i>chuppah</i> in Jewish weddings and the Jewish ketubah (wedding contract). tzedekah (charity) in Judaism How the creation story links with beliefs about caring for the world and the Jewish idea of tikkun olam (repairing the world) and Tu B'shevat (new year for trees). 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The meanings of the stories behind the festivals, e.g. Pesach, Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur The ceremonies of bar/bat mitzvah/chayil. What Jewish people believe about life after death; how do they mark the end of life? The Ten Commandments Jewish teachings about being thankful (the Talmud teaches that Jews should say thank you 100 times a day! The Siddur prayer book contains 'baruch atah Adonai' prayers - 'Blessed are you, King of the universe').
